Extracts from the "Spectator."

"Next came lightning sketches by Mr. I. A. Tenny, a left handed Deaf Mute, who drew with marvellous rapidity charcoal pictures."

"A very interesting item was the sign representation of Longfellow's 'Village Blacksmith,' by Mr. J. E. Muir. The spectators could almost hear the words as they watched the signs."

"Another Deaf Mute, Mr. Leslie Downes, was making ornamental objects out of sheets of thin paper, using no instrument but the fingers. He folded the sheets, pinched little bits out of them here and there, and the result was wonderful."

"Then came the gem of the Evening, 'Rock of Ages in Statuary and Song," the words of the hymn softly sung by the Cornish Choir to an exquisitively delicate organ accompaniment by by Mr. E. J. Watkin. The Grouping of Living Statuary with the limelight thrown upon them from either side, motionless as marble figures, but with the life and love and adoration in their eyes and on their faces, formed the most beautiful objects we have ever beheld. The Audience looked and listened in breathless silence, and many eyes were glistening with tears."

"Another item fairly; took the Audience by storm. It was an example of Humour in the Language of Gesture by Mr. W. A. Paterson, a Deaf Mute. He personified a lady making ready to take her walks abroad. She combed her imaginary hair, twisted it, coiled it up on the top of her head, fastened it with numerous hairpins, put on her jacket, stabbed her hat through and through with long hairpins, drew down her veil, and twisted it under her chin to keep it in its place. All was in dumb show; but it was understood perfectly even by the inferior set, and the ladies showed their appreciation by continuous laughter and applause."

The Proposed Institute for the ADULT Deaf and Dumb

OF VICTORIA.

There are Institutes for **ADULT** Deaf Mutes in Adelaide and Sydney, also all the cities and large towns of England, Ireland, Scotland, and Wales. They cannot avail themselves with any profit of the Educational, Social, and Religious provisions intended for hearing people, but these have to be conducted in their own language. The object is to raise sufficient money to build and equip a permanent Institute for the **ADULT** Deaf and Dumb, and an adequate income for its maintenance. A piece of land in Flinders Street, Melbourne, has already been procured and paid for at a cost of £1,600 and the Treasurer has £2,000 in hand toward the building.

The new Institute which is so sorely needed will be to the Deaf and Dumb what the Church, Sunday School, Lecture Hall, Library, Technical School, Social Club, Sick Club, Employment Agency, and Relief Office are to hearing persons. Their affliction draws them together more closely than others, and they share more intimately their joys and sorrows.

Bereft as they are of two of our most cherished senses, hearing and speech, we are confident the claims of the Deaf and Dumb will find a place in all our hearts.
